COMMENTS on FBI Director James Comey's statement/press-release

of 7-5-2015 (by Dick Anderson)

First, some FACTS:

Hillary was COMPLETELY Aware of our Security Laws.

Hillary was COMPLETELY Aware of WHY information is guarded by our Security Laws.

Hillary was COMPLETELY Aware of what constitutes CLASSIFIED information.

Hillary was COMPLETELY Aware that CLASSIFIED info NOT guarded by our National Security Agencies & Laws is VERY LIKELY to be HACKED by "unfriendly" people & Governments.

Hillary was AUTHORIZED to CLASSIFY information where it was so.

Today (7-5-2016), on TV,

FBI Director JAMES COMEY said:

1. Hillary Clinton DID use a private server.
- against the law.
2. That she erased records that DID contain SECRET (Confidential, Secret or Top Secret) information - without completely cleaning it.
- against the law.
3. That she knew having a private server for Secret information is illegal.
- against the law.
4. That it was HIGHLY LIKELY that the servers HAD been compromised.-
- against the law.
5. She forwarded CLASSIFIED information to NON-APPROVED, NON-SECURE email addresses & servers.
- against the law.
6. That they DID find CLASSIFIED information on her servers.
- against the law.
7. That they found CLASSIFIED info that Hillary had sent on other servers.
- against the law.
8. That she had sent out CLASSIFIED info that was NOT marked as CLASSIFIED.
- against the law.
9. That she had received CLASSIFIED info that was NOT marked as CLASSIFIED and did NOTHING about it.
- against the law.

Then, he went ahead and said:

We don't believe there was "Criminal Intent" so, we are recommending NOT to indict.

Nowhere in the law does it REQUIRE Criminal Intent.

And, most of all:

- The LAW requires that anyplace there is evidence that a Crime POSSIBLY was Committed, it MUST be submitted to a Grand Jury.
- The evidence is presented to the appropriate Prosecutor, whose is to submit it to the Grand Jury.
- The Grand Jury then decides if the Evidence is such that a Crime MAY have been Committed, in which case they direct it to the appropriate Prosecuting person or body.
- Then, the Prosecutor decides if it will be prosecuted. If they decide to prosecute, then, and ONLY then, a JURY decides if the accused is Innocent or Guilty.
